

Funding Program Comparison

for Child Care Businesses in Oregon

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Introduction

First Children's Finance prepared a comprehensive comparative analysis of three prominent child care funding programs in Oregon: Employment-Related Day Care, Preschool Promise, and Baby Promise. This analysis examines the application processes, eligibility criteria, and compliance requirements of these programs, with a particular focus on identifying potential areas of alignment. By understanding the similarities and differences between these initiatives, the Oregon Department of Early Learning and Care (DELC) can gain valuable insights to optimize resource allocation, streamline administrative processes, and enhance the overall effectiveness of early childhood support systems in Oregon.

The ERDC program plays a vital role in Oregon's child care assistance landscape, offering support to eligible low-income families in accessing affordable and dependable child care services. Preschool Promise is geared towards providing high-quality early education opportunities to three and four-year-old children from low-income

families. The Baby Promise program, as a recent addition to Oregon's early childhood funding initiatives, focuses on comprehensive support for families with infants and toddlers.

Through this comparison, the report aims to inform potential areas of alignment among the ERDC, Preschool Promise, and Baby Promise programs, presenting opportunities for collaboration and resource coordination. By leveraging this information, DELC can refine funding program requirements, streamline administrative processes, and enhance the overall efficacy of early childhood support systems in Oregon. This analysis can also serve as a valuable resource, equipping child care business owners with the knowledge necessary to navigate and maximize their participation in these programs. Ultimately, this report seeks to contribute to the ongoing efforts of DELC in providing equitable access to quality early childhood education and care, fostering the educational development and well-being of the state's youngest learners.

Additional Early Education Funding Opportunities

Oregon Pre-Kindergarten (OPK) is an early childhood education program modeled after Head Start. OPK is designed to provide high-quality care and education to children and prepare them for a successful transition to kindergarten. The program focuses on enhancing cognitive, social, emotional, and physical skills through a play-based and developmentally appropriate curriculum.

Head Start and Early Head Start are federally funded early childhood education programs that aim to promote school readiness and provide support to low-income children and their families. Head Start serves children aged three to five, while Early Head Start caters to pregnant women, infants, and toddlers up to age three. These programs focus on early intervention and aim to narrow the educational and opportunity gaps for children.

The Oregon Early Childhood Equity Fund is an initiative established in Oregon to promote equity and improve early childhood education outcomes for children. The

fund is designed to address the disparities and inequities that exist in early childhood education, particularly among marginalized and underserved communities. Its primary goal is to ensure that every child, regardless of their background or circumstances, has access to high-quality early childhood education programs and services. The Early Childhood Equity Fund provides financial resources to support community-based organizations, schools, and early learning programs that prioritize equity and demonstrate a commitment to addressing the unique needs of diverse populations.

Oregon's Relief Nurseries provide comprehensive support and services to vulnerable children and families in need. They prioritize trauma-informed care and focus on building resilience in children who may have had adverse childhood experiences. By providing early childhood care and wraparound services, Relief Nurseries aim to mitigate the effects of trauma, strengthen family relationships, and promote healthy development.

Employment Related Day Care (ERDC)

Oregon's Employment-Related Day Care (ERDC) program is the state's child care subsidy program. Using federal and state-funding, ERDC provides assistance to low-income working families in Oregon by helping them pay for child care expenses.

The program is designed to support parents who are working, attending school, or participating in job training programs. Eligibility for ERDC is determined based on income, with priority given to families with the greatest need.

ERDC offers various types of child care assistance, including direct payments to child care providers, subsidies for families to purchase child care services, and assistance with paying for before and after school care.

The program aims to ensure that parents can work and support their families while their children receive quality care in a safe and nurturing environment.

Preschool Promise

Oregon's Preschool Promise program is a state-funded initiative that provides high-quality preschool education to children from low-income families. The program aims to give children a strong foundation for future success by providing them with access to early learning opportunities.

Preschool promise is available to children who are three or four years old an whose families meet income eligibility requirements.

Families can choose from a variety of preschool providers, including public and private schools, Head Start programs, and community-based organizations. The program also provides resources and support for families to help them engage in their child's education and development.

The goal of the Preschool Promise program is to ensure that all children in Oregon have access to high-quality early learning experiences that prepare them for success in school and in life.

Baby Promise

Oregon's Baby Promise program is a state-funded initiative aimed at providing access to high-quality, comprehensive early childhood education and care for children from birth to the age of three.

This program is targeted to serve low-income families in communities struggling to find and keep high quality care for infants and toddlers.

The program has been piloted to develop and refine strategies to expand infant and toddler care in the state.
